Webquest

The What

Webquests allow students to conduct an online investigation at their own pace using a list of teacher-selected online sources. Use this format to support students' independence in navigating the web while conducting targeted research.

The How

- 1. Review the rules of the Webquest.
 - Students should only explore teacher-approved websites during their research time, but may explore those sites in any order and at their own pace.
 - As they explore, students should record notes corresponding to each website.
 - If students will have the freedom to explore additional sources of their choice, consider directing students to a safe-search site, such as kiddle.co.
- 2. Model how to navigate to different sites and take brief notes to conserve time.
- 3. Facilitate the Webquest.
 - Set a timer to keep students focused on the task.
 - As students work, circulate and challenge them to explain why they selected the sources they did, and what evidence they are finding. Correct misconceptions as needed.
- 4. Ask students to synthesize their notes and findings in a whole-class share-out and/or in writing.
